This marks 236 years since our Founding Fathers signed the Declaration of Independence. The purpose of the document was a formal explanation by the Continental

Congress on why they voted on July 2, 1776 to declare independence from Great Britain after the outbreak of the American Revolution more than a year earlier. The document was formally ratified on July 4, 1776 when 56 men affixed their name to it in Independence Hall, Philadelphia, PA. Of those 56 men, 9 or 16% percent were Masons. They included prominent men such as Benjamin Franklin and John Hancock. It is also interesting to note that 33 of 74, or 46%, of generals serving in the Continental Army were Masons to include George Washington, Marquis de Lafayette and Baron Frederick von Steuben. So as Masons, forget not the positive contributions we have had on our Nation's History. So, I ask you to show pride in our Nation and our Masonic history and fly our National Ensign on July 4, 2012.

Just a reminder that the July Stated Communication is Hawaiian Shirt Night, so wear yours that evening. Our ladies are also invited to join us for dinner and I hope they too will come dressed for the occasion. RW Wayne Sawyer Flora, Grand Senior Warden for the Grand Lodge of Virginia, will be our guest speaker in Lodge that evening.

Finally, forget not our servicemen and women still serving at home and abroad this July 4th. Keep them in your thoughts and prayers. For they are making great sacrifices, and some the ultimate sacrifice, to preserve our unalienable Rights, among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness. Also keep in mind our sick and infirmed Brethren and our Masonic Sweethearts. Visit and call upon them when the opportunity presents itself.

#### From The South



Did you know that John Adams believed that July 2nd was the correct date on which to celebrate the birth of American Independence, and would reportedly turn down invitations to

appear at July 4th events in protest. On June 7th, when the Continental Congress met at the Pennsylvania State House (later Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, the Virginia delegate Richard Henry Lee introduced a motion calling for the colonies' independence. On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of Lee's resolution in a near unanimous vote. On that day, John Adams wrote to his wife Abigail that July 2nd "will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival" and that the celebration should include "Pomp and Parade... Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one end of this Continent to the other." On July 4th, the Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence, which had been written largely by Thomas Jefferson. Though the vote for actual independence took place on July 2nd, from then on July 4th became the day that was celebrated as the birth of American Independence. John Adams and Thomas Jefferson both died on July 4th, 1826--the 50th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence.
