Brethren all – FYI: DUES INCREASE! Be informed in advance of the dues increase for 2019. The delegates to the 2017 Grand Annual Communication voted and approved a \$10. increase for the "Grand Lodge portion" of dues of all Subordinate Lodges, effective January 1, 2019.
