75th Anniversary of V-J Day and the End of WW II

On September 2, 2020, the United States marked the 75th anniversary of V-J (Victory Over Japan) Day. This recognizes the formal surrender ceremony that was held in Tokyo Bay aboard the battleship USS Missouri on September 2, 1945. With the defeat of Nazi Germany in early May, 1945, this effectively ended World War II, the bloodiest conflict in human history which left over 70 million people dead.



The Japanese surrender followed the dropping of atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki on August 6th and 9th, respectively. On August 9th, the Soviet Union declared war on Japan. The Japanese government on August 10th

communicated its intention to surrender. On August 14th, Allied governments announced the surrender of Japan, and the Emperor of Japan informed his people of the fact in an unprecedented radio broadcast. Japanese forces remained in combat with Soviet forces on several fronts for two weeks following the August 14th announcement. In the United Kingdom, V-J Day is marked on August 15th, the date (due to time zone differences) that the Japanese Emperor Hirohito broadcast his country's surrender.

Many Masons fought in World War II, including several living members of Kempsville Masonic Lodge. A number of Masons were highly distinguished during the war, winning the Medal of Honor. What follows is a short description of two of these men and their accomplishments, one from the European and one from the Pacific theater.

One of the most well known Masonic heroes, and the most decorated soldier in WW II, was Brother Audie Murphy. Murphy enlisted in the Army at the age of 17 after having been turned down by the Navy, Marines, and Army Air Corps. He spent 30 months in combat in World War Two and earned the Congressional Medal of Honor for his single-handed defeat of an estimated 250 enemy soldiers and six King Tiger tanks. For over one hour he remained alone atop a burning tank destroyer calling artillery adjustments and manning a .50 caliber machine gun. He was personally responsible for protecting his sector and certainly saving his unit from destruction.

After the war, Murphy became a best-selling author and a very successful motion picture actor, and portrayed himself in the autobiographical film "To Hell and Back" which became the highest grossing film in the history of Universal Studios until it was finally knocked off the charts by "Jaws" some 20 years later. In all, he starred in or produced a total of 44 feature films. He was a member of North Hollywood Lodge No. 542 in Dallas, Texas and was a 32nd Degree Scottish Rite Mason.

In the Pacific Theater, Brother Jimmie Doolittle won the Medal of Honor for his planning and execution of what would be known as "Doolittle's Raid", the first attack on the Japanese homeland on April 18th, 1942. The Raid was flown off of the USS Hornet using 16 B-26B bombers. Due to poor weather and a lack of fuel in the case of at least one aircraft, all of the crews were forced to ditch and parachute into China. Although the Raid itself did minimal damage, it had a direct impact on the war in the Pacific. The Raid embarrassed Japanese military leaders and forced them to redeploy their troops.

Doolittle was promoted to lieutenant general and commanded the Twelfth Air Force over North America, the Fifteenth Air Force over the Mediterranean, and the Eighth Air Force over Europe. He was a member of Hollenbeck Lodge No. 319 in Los Angeles, California and was also a 33rd Scottish Rite Mason and a Shriner.

Last month I provided all of you with an update on the way ahead for Kempsville for the remainder of 2020 in light to the restrictions placed upon us by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Unfortunately, we have had to cancel our annual Lodge picnic and Bull Roast fundraiser because we cannot serve food at the Lodge, either for our own consumption or for fundraisers. We do not expect this situation to change until at least the fall, and then only if the virus has significantly abated. The Grand Lodge has, correctly, prioritized the health of our members and their families over Lodge events.

In August I sent out a letter to each of you asking you to make a one-time donation to the Lodge equal to the amount you would have spent on tickets for the Bull Roast. I did this because our Bull Roast is our biggest fundraiser of the year and we need to make up the approximately \$6,000 shortfall created by its cancellation. As is our tradition here at Kempsville, I have already made a personal donation equal to 10 Bull Roast tickets, and I have asked each of my Officers to do the same. Thank you in advance for your support!

You may also be aware that, due to the virus, we have been prohibited by the Grand Lodge of Virginia from performing degree conferrals. This has resulted in us having 9 candidates who have been ready to receive their next degree for several months. We are pleased to announce that District 56 will be holding a one-day degree conferral on October 3rd during which our Entered Apprentices and Fellowcrafts will be able to complete all their degrees at one time. Although this is not the path we would have preferred to take, it will enable us to make them all Master Masons before the end of 2020.

Even though we will be limited in some of our activities for as long as COVID-19 is a threat, we still have a lot of good work to accomplish in 2020. We will continue to regularly conduct ritual training and Masonic education, and we will continue to serve our community through food bank food collections, purchasing Thanksgiving dinners for needy families, and collecting donations of new clothing and toys for the Salvation Army Angel Tree program in late November. Please continue to look out for each other and contact me personally if you need any assistance.

Norfolk Lodge No.1 was originally constituted in August 1732 under the name "Royal Exchange Lodge No. 172" due to the fact that it met above the Royal Exchange tavern in Norfolk. It was then established by English Constitution on December 22, 1733 as one of the earliest Masonic Lodges in

Virginia, America and the first Masonic Lodge in the Colony and Dominion of Virginia. The Lodge participated in the formation of the Grand Lodge of Virginia during the years 1777-1778. After giving up its English charter and applying for a charter from the new Grand Lodge of Virginia, an examination of the historical evidence led the Grand Lodge of Virginia to formally designate Norfolk Lodge as lodge number 1 on October 20, 1786.
