Life Membership in Perpetuity

At the June Stated Communication of the Lodge, Article II of the by-laws was amended to increase the annual dues to \$95, plus Grand Lodge assessments, effective January 1, 2024. Total dues will increase to \$150. (Lodge dues plus Grand Lodge assessments)

If you have ever considered investing in the Life Membership in Perpetuity program (LMIP), now might be the time to do so. Until December 31, 2023, the cost to purchase the LMIP is 25-times the annual dues (having your current year's dues paid). On January 1, 2024, the LMIP cost will increase from 25-times \$117., to 25-times \$150. Payments may be in full, incremental, or by credit card.

If you might be interested in the LMIP program, contact the lodge Secretary. An investment in LMIP benefits you by never paying dues again, even if there is an increase. It also benefits the lodge beyond your lifetime.


Brother Doug Dunn

Major General Joshua Chamberlain was a member of United Lodge 8, Brunswick, Maine. After the war, he became Governor of Maine from 1866-71 and President of Bowdoin College from 1871-83. He is also featured in the movie "Gettysburg" for his role in holding Little Round Top.



The Final Act by a Mason in The American Civil War

It was an April morning three days after General Robert E. Lee had surrendered to General Ulysses S. Grant. The Southern troops, led by General John B. Gordon, a Mason, were marching in columns towards the Northern troops who were standing in formation waiting for the Southerners to stack arms and fold their flags. Suddenly a shifting of arms was heard. Gordon looked up with alarm, but there was nothing to fear. General Joshua Chamberlain had ordered his troops to assume the position of "honor answering honor." Immediately, the Confederate troops snapped to attention and returned the honor. It was the first act to heal the
