

The Tavern Lodges

As it is the beginning of a new Masonic year, it seemed appropriate to speak about the place where modern Masonry under the Grand Lodge system began – in taverns and alehouses. The first meeting to discuss the creation of the Grand Lodge of England was held in the Apple Tree Tavern in London in 1717, while the meeting held to organize it was subsequently held in the better-known Goose and Gridiron alehouse. It is not surprising that the alehouses were the chosen meeting location for Masonic Lodges in the early eighteenth century, as



they had become the primary location for members of the London trade guilds to seek and find employment. The Masonic Lodges had a general appeal to the craftsmen of this period.

Taverns had a very different reputation in the 1700s than similar establishments have today. They were already established as commercial centers for merchants and traders, and were economic centers for overland transport and communications. They were also pillars of social activity for the affluent and well-to-do as well as laborers, and also acted as chief meeting places for country gentlemen. They were substantial institutions that provided ample space for those requiring assembly and privacy.

By the 1800s, changes in social customs saw the replacement of the taverns by coffee houses in major cities. Most of the Masonic Lodges established their own buildings during this period. Leisure activities became "privatized", with various organizations owning their own real property as opposed to meeting in alehouses or taverns.

Although taverns and alehouses were relatively short-lived as hosts for the Masonic institution, they facilitated the transition from operative to speculative lodges and effectively served as the birthplace of Masonry before and during the Grand Lodge era as well as during the beginnings of Freemasonry in the colonies. Many, if not most Lodges in England and the colonies during the 1700s reached their adulthood without ever seeing the walls of a temple, meeting house, or other place looked upon today as a place of dignity and respect.

This year Kempsville Masonic Lodge celebrates its 65th anniversary. Dispensation for the Lodge to meet was granted on June 28th, 1954, and the first stated meeting was held on

July 13th of that year at the old Davis Corner Fire Station on Davis Street off of Virginia Beach Boulevard. At that time the Lodge had 28 members and met under the leadership of our legendary first Worshipful Master (and later 50-year Secretary), Worshipful William Hollowell Pierce. The Lodge would subsequently receive its charter on February 9th, 1955. We will celebrate this milestone at our February 2020 stated meeting.

Today, 65 years later, Kempsville Masonic Lodge No. 196 continues to thrive with almost 400 members, making it one of the largest Lodges in Virginia. We also continue to be one of the most active Lodges in the district and state, and we are very proud of our extensive involvement with our both our community and local charities. We love to tell our story through social media, in our newsletter The Ashlar, and in our visits to other Lodges.

As the 66th Worshipful Master of Kempsville, I stand on the shoulders of giants – those Worshipful Masters who have served before me and have helped make our Lodge what it is today. I am greatly honored by the trust and confidence that has been placed in me by my Brothers, and I assure you all that I will devote myself in 2020 to continuing our tradition of excellence in all that we do.
