65th Anniversary of Kempsville Masonic Lodge

On February 5th 2020, Kempsville Masonic Lodge No. 196 celebrated its 65th anniversary as a chartered Masonic Lodge. That was the date that the Lodge was granted its charter by the Grand Lodge of Virginia.

Per the Grand Lodge of Virginia Methodical Digest, the charter of a Lodge is an instrument written or printed upon parchment and signed by the Grand Master that enables a Lodge to “enter Apprentices, pass Fellowcrafts, and raise Master Masons, and to perform other work agreeably to the ancient customs and usages of Freemasonry.” The charter must always be in the Lodge room or ante-room during a session of the Lodge; if any such meeting is held without the presence of the charter or dispensation, the minutes thereof are not considered as the record of a Masonic Lodge and must be expunged. The charter is also ceremonially presented to the incoming Worshipful Master during his installation.



Before receiving its charter, Kempsville Masonic Lodge began life as a Lodge “under dispensation” (with “U.D.” taking the place of the Lodge number in the meeting minutes) on June 28th, 1954 by permission of the Grand Lodge of Virginia. Charters are only allowed to be applied for by Lodges under dispensation, and then only by the Grand Lodge during its Annual Communication. At the time of its creation as a Lodge under dispensation, Kempsville had 28 members. Its Worshipful Master was Worshipful William Hollowell Pierce, who was Master of Great Bridge Lodge No. 257 in 1952 and who would subsequently go on to be Secretary of the Lodge for 50 years.

Although the Lodge was granted its charter on February 7th, it did not actually receive it until Charter Night on February 15th, 1955. By that time, Kempsville Masonic Lodge U.D. had 51 members. In addition to Worshipful Master Bill Pierce, the other Stationed Officers included Senior Warden Worshipful George Ferrell, a Past Master of Princess Anne Lodge No. 25, and Junior Warden Levi Jackson, a Past Master of Owens Lodge No. 164.

The record of the minutes of the Lodge record the following concerning that night. Kempsville Masonic Lodge U.D. opened a Master Masons Lodge at 7:30 PM, while at the same time a Provisional Lodge was opened in the ante room. This Provisional Lodge consisted of a team of DDGMs, PDDGMs, and PMs including R.:W.: Willis V. Fentress, the Deputy Grand Master as the Provisional Master of the Lodge. The Provisional Master was then informed by message from the Master of Kempsville Lodge U.D. that they were ready and desirous of being constituted. The Provisional Officers of the Lodge then entered the Lodge room and took their stations and places. An examining committee (one PDDGM and three PMs) appointed by the Provisional Master reported that they had examined the Officers of Kempsville Lodge U.D. and found them satisfactory.

The Provisional Lodge then consecrated, dedicated, and constituted Kempsville Masonic Lodge #196 and the Provisional Master installed the officers. The Lodge would then go on to conduct its business and then close its first stated meeting. The Lodge would continue to meet in the old Davis Corner Fire Station on Davis Street off Virginia Beach Boulevard until September 1957, when the first stated meeting in the newly-built Masonic Temple was held. Some 780 meetings and 65 years later, Kempsville is still going strong with nearly 400 members.

From The East



It is hard to believe that I am already almost two months into my year as Worshipful Master of Kempsville Masonic Lodge No. 196. I was told by our Past Masters that the year goes by quickly when you are in the East, but I never expected it to race by like this. Although I have been busy every day with running the Lodge and visiting other Lodges, I have greatly enjoyed every minute of it. It has truly been a Masonic labor of love serving all of you.

On January 4th I briefed the Past Masters on my plans and goals for the year. At the top of my list is to accelerate our efforts in getting an elevator installed in the Lodge. I am committed to making this a reality as we must have accessibility to our second floor for our elderly and disabled members. I have asked our junior Past Master (and new Tiler) Worshipful Roger Taylor to lead a Lodge elevator committee due to his experience with this project over the past year. He has graciously agreed to run this effort. Our first step will be to get a definitive set of design drawings made up so we can get a firm estimate from a contractor. I will provide monthly updates in this column on our efforts.

In mid-January I had our 28 year-old downstairs furnace inspected due to erratic operation. We found that the heat exchanger was cracked and not repairable or replaceable and was a carbon monoxide safety risk to our members. I therefore directed that a new furnace be installed. The cost of this replacement was a little over \$2000.

Thanks to the great generosity of our members, we have been able to cover \$10,000 of the \$16,000 of the cost of repairing the building foundation in December. With the replacement of the furnace though we are still approximately \$8,000 in the hole with these two repairs. I would ask that anyone who has not yet donated to these two projects please consider doing so. Our Lodge building is our legacy to future Kempsville Masons.

I have been asked by our members get the hard-copy of the Ashlar to our members by the first of each month. It takes about 3 weeks from the time we submit our articles to the time the Ashlar is delivered in the mail. Therefore we will, starting with the March issue, ensure that the document goes to the printer by the 5th of each month.

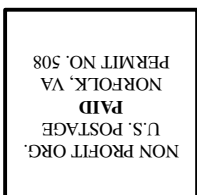
Past Master's Breakfast
