Bannack Lodge and the Montana Vigilantes

Action by Masonic bodies have a long history in America. It is known that the Masonic lodge in Boston was unable to meet the night of the Boston Tea Party due to a lack of officers present. No one is sure where they went, but its an easy answer to imagine. Another place this call to action occurred was in the now ghost town of Bannack Montana.

On July 28, 1862, gold was discovered along Grasshopper Creek, leading to the establishment of the town of Bannack. With the miners came those that prey on them.

It is estimated that 100 people were killed in "road agent" robberies in the fall of 1863. These road agents where able to avoid legal repercussions for their actions because their leader was the local Sherrif Henry Plummer. Plummer had done time for murder of a Marshal and others before coming to Bannack from California. Once in Bannack he helped to drive the current Sherrif away and took the job for himself. Once in office he appointed several of his associates, and fellow road agents, from California as deputies. This official capacity gave them insight into the movement of people and more importantly gold in the local area. They referred to themselves as the Innocents.

In response, The Vigilance Committee of Alder Gulch was organized in December 1863. They captured at least 20 road agents of the infamous Sheriff Plummer gang in the first six weeks of 1864 including the secretary of the group who, after providing a membership list, was hanged by the organization.

One of the primary agents in this event was Nathan P. Langford who wrote firsthand accounts of his time as a vigilante. He was the one who requested a dispensation to form a lodge in Bannack but by the time it arrived from Nebraska, the first charter having been stolen by road agents, everyone had moved on to Virginia City.

The numerical symbol 3-7-77 has long been associated with Montana vigilantes. When the numbers 3-7-77 were painted on a tent or cabin, it was a warning that the occupants could face vigilantism if they did not leave the area. Its meaning is unclear though many theories have been put forward trying to explain what it symbolized. 3-7-77 is so ingrained in Montana lore it appears on Montana State troopers' patches.

It is said that not all vigilantes where Masons, but all Masons were vigilantes. The shared Masonic affiliation created a bond among the miners that formed the Vigilance committee, contributing to the cohesion and organization of their efforts. The Masonic lodges provided a framework for trust, secrecy, and a shared commitment to a sense of justice that transcended the official legal system.

It is essential to recognize that the connection between Freemasonry and the Vigilantes does not imply a universal endorsement of vigilantism within the Masonic community. Freemasonry, as an organization, has always emphasized the importance of adhering to the rule of law and working within established societal frameworks. The connection between Freemasonry and the Vigilantes in Montana's history is a historical curiosity, illustrating the complex interplay of individuals, values, and the unique circumstances of a particular time.

Bannack Lodge gave a safe space for discussion of the murders and robberies. Plummers gang had used other local community spaces, Bars, Stables, Stores, and official complaints to keep tabs on the local miners and to quell any calls for action. The only place they were not was in the local Lodge. Plummer

unique opportunities if you wish to come along. This is Masonry in action, traveling together and watching over each other, just like Lewis and Clark.

When contemplating on the theme of Freemasonry in Action, I kept trying to recall some grand event where a member of the fraternity made some grand gesture the embodied all that

we hold up as good. However, the longer I thought on the matter the more I believe that Freemasonry is about all the small things the brethren do for each other time and time again that represent the best things about our craft. Things such as the crew that cooks breakfast without hesitation every month, ensuring that we have an enduring event that families mark on their calendars and look forward to. It is the heartfelt updates we get during the stated concerning the health and welfare of our lodge members and their families. It is the general willingness to lend a hand when the need arises.

An example that always comes to mind for me personally happened about 15 years ago when I was attending Job's Daughters Grand Session in Ferrum, Virginia about five hours from Virginia Beach. We had taken a charter bus with Bethel 42 to the event and received a call from my then teenaged son that my father-in-law, Bob Iones, was not making sense and having difficulty walking. I immediately reached out to brother Masons W. Bruce Cook, W. Rick Cazenave and W. Jim Doubikin who rushed over to the house to check on him and remain with him until the ambulance arrived. Then another brother Hank Sadler, whom I barely knew at the time, handed me the keys to his brandnew Cadillac and told me to take Marta and drive home and he would take the charter bus back. In that moment, these small acts made all the difference in the world.

Years later Bob was diagnosed with terminal cancer. My son Jeran had decided to petition the lodge and Bob's wish was to see Jeran raised prior to his passing. Jeran lived in northern Virginia and members of Herndon Lodge No. 264 and our own

W. Rob Worthington worked on coaching Jeran on his catechisms when he was not in Virginia Beach. As a result of all those efforts, Jeran was raised in just five weeks from his initiation. Bob was in attendance and so very proud. He passed away a couple of weeks later. This is indelibly etched on me as what is best about Masonry.

When I received orders to Washington D.C. in 2021, I needed to put my house on the market. We had it inspected, created a punch list of all the issues requiring repair and asked for help over the weekend. People turned out in force including Worshipfuls Mike Deming, Ken Chord, Bruce Cook and T-Rex, Right Worshipful Joe Daigle, and Brother Leandro Herculano. With their assistance and others, we were able to correct all discrepancies and sell the house within 24 hours of putting it on the market. This would not have been possible without the help of these Brothers.

Finally, in May, Brother Michael Johnson of Corinthian Lodge No. 266 had a heart attack. Wendy Graefe happened to be passing by, jumped the fence and administered CPR until paramedics arrived about 10 minutes later, unquestionably saving his life. W. Bruce Cook requested and received a Grand Lodge of Virginia Award of Excellence for Wendy and arranged for her to meet Michael at their annual lodge picnic. Channel 3 news was there to cover it. Bruce's actions served to highlight to the community that good things happen and gave a small token of appreciation to a hero for her selfless actions.

These events are what Freemasonry in Action mean to me. If we take these small actions every day we can improve the world for those within our sphere of influence. If every Mason were to do so, our craft would surely change the world.
